Cloister thoughts...

We all know what it is like to receive a letter in the mail. And quickly we can scan the letters and make a judgment - junk mail, solicitation, bills and ahhh - a personal letter. Then the heart beats a little faster — is this good news — bad news. We rip it open and quickly in the first few sentences we can tell — if this is a letter to build us up or to tear us down.

I often hear people say — they have a keepsake drawer, or a special box where they save all the "good, affirming" letters that they received...so when they are having a bad day — or they are feeling all alone...they can take out one and read it — to be restored to a place of hope — a moment of grace.

First Peter is an early letter to leaders of churches in Asia Minor, probably not actually written by Peter but certainly claiming his authority as an apostle and leader of the church. The letter is a pastoral letter — it is written from the heart of a pastor and the caregiving for the church. The letter emphasizes Christian unity and seeks to encourage those who are facing persecution by Rome and the surrounding pagan culture.

The shot in the arm the letter offers is a reminder that they are not only individuals but they are God's people...they may feel personal struggles but God has called them forth to be "a holy nation, God's own people" (1 Peter 1:9). Immediately, the tape in my mind turns on — and I hear the recording once again — of those adolescent years when I would head out the door and my mom would say, "Remember who you are."

Think of it! The hodgepodge of misfits that made up the early church – some converted Jews, some Gentiles, some pagans, some renegades – are now God's people, the church. We are no different today. Some preparatory Christians, some prodigal sons, some saints, and some renegades, we are God's people. We are widows and widowers, single people and married people, children; we are doctors, lawyers, and administrative assistances and painters. We are God's people, chosen out of our uniqueness to work together to be a holy nation.

We have no more claim to be God's chosen people than did those in the first-century church. We are blemished with our sins...we have all made mistakes, said and done the wrong thing. If the kingdom of God were open only to those who deserved it, we would all be in trouble. The author of First Peter helps us visualize how we individually are becoming the house for God. "Like living stones," he writes, "let yourselves be built

into a spiritual house" (1 Peter 2:5).

We are individuals joined together in community to make a difference in the world. Saints and renegades together, and most of us somewhere in between, we work together to be living stones built as a dwelling place for God in our midst.

The main character in Hannah Hunnard's book, Hinds' Feet on High Places, is seeking to walk with God, and yet she is surprised that the path is rough and rocky. Time after time she stumbles and falls, all the time wishing that she could run like a mountain deer, with "hinds' feet on high places." Her angelic companions tell her, though, to pick up stones from the places that are roughest, and to keep them with her, together in a small bag.

I like that image, picking up stones to remember the hard spots in our lives after we have gotten beyond them. What she does at the end of the journey, though, is build an altar out of those very same stones, out of the broken pieces of her heart.

We are individuals joined together in community to make a difference in the world.

Beloved friends, as we journey these rough and hard days during this Pandemic, imagine picking up a stone for all the challenges you have faced, prepared to build an altar of thanksgiving for the strength emerging from your spiritual house of faith. We become the living stones, a holy priesthood ministering out of our community to the whole people of God.



Discerning a Path in Re-opening Hayes Barton United Methodist Church

As NC enters Phase II of re-opening, we have implemented four Task Force groups in our church to discern ways that we can begin in-person meetings and worship over the next several months. The groups will include staff members as well as church members to ensure we are being comprehensive in designing guidelines to keep everyone healthy and safe.

Below are just a few of the guidelines being considered as each Task Force continues to do research and engage in conversation with members. We invite your prayerful support as we pioneer these days of gathering as the body of Christ.

Staffing

In moving towards allowing the physical space of the church to be more available to staff, the safety of people employed by Hayes Barton UMC and members of the congregation is the top priority. Therefore, the following protocols have been recommended:

- Social distancing among staff must be respected: 6 feet of separation between all staff and members present.
- Staff should schedule office hours. This will help to make sure that staff can comfortably social distance. Staff members that share an office space must be thoughtful of coordinating office hours with each other. Staff that can effectively work from home are encouraged to do so.
- Masks must be worn in common areas. Staff do not have to use masks when taking breaks at a safe distance from others or when in their own office space. Disposable masks will be available for staff that need or request them.
- All staff must be responsible to clean up after themselves, wash or sanitize hands regularly, and sign in when they have been working in the facilities of HBUMC.

Worship

During **Phase II**, online worship will continue with no inperson gatherings.

In-person worship for both traditional and LightHouse *may* begin at some point during **Phase III** while we continue to stream online worship. The closed environment, limited ingress/egress and longer duration of corporate worship are challenges for the logistics to returning to in-person services.

Hayes Barton Support: Helping Each Other

You are supporting each other at this time! Visiting Friends are calling the In Crowd and sending notes, as are members of the elementary department; the Stephen Ministers and staff have been calling those in the age bracket of 70 and up (a total of about 415 individuals); and the JOY Class are sending notes to Starnes Class and In Crowd members as well as our high school seniors. Several members have been preparing meals for people that are alone in their homes.

Details of these logistics will reflect an abundance of caution in limiting exposure for congregants and worship leaders alike:

- Maintain 6-ft distancing
- Operate the campus as two independent facilities (Traditional worship via Stone St. / LightHouse via Reid St.)
- Implement Enhanced Hygienic and Tracking Practices
- Nursery and Extended Session will not be offered in **Phase III**

Small Groups

- Small groups for church meetings, Bible studies, and covenant groups will continue to meet via Zoom or other web-based platforms in Phase II.
- During Phase III, small groups will continue to meet via web-based platforms. The church building may be open in a limited capacity for small groups who provide a guest list, wear face masks, and limit their activities to prescribed areas.
- In the fall, we expect that small groups will be able to meet both virtually and in person. We are examining technology that allows groups to meet simultaneously in person and virtually.

Preschool and Wee Care

We plan to follow the Wake County Public Schools with respect to an opening date for the Preschool and Wee Care.

- We will follow guidance of CDC, federal and local governments, NC Department of Health and Human Services and Wake County Public Schools with respect to social distancing, screening for signs of illness, use of personal protective equipment, cleaning procedures, etc.
- We will review and make recommendations regarding the use of shared spaces and equipment (for example the Children's Fellowship Hall, the Children's Kitchen, restrooms, playground and CHH).
- We will review and make recommendations regarding the preparation, delivery, distribution and location of snacks and meals.
- We will review and make recommendations regarding the transportation, drop off and collection of children.

Your efforts are appreciated. A member of the In Crowd recently shared how much it means to her to get notes and phone calls from the church (she lives alone in her home and

Finance Corner

We thank the congregation for their steady, generous gifts that have put us in strong financial shape this month. Through April we have collected 41% of the current year's pledges; a record high! Non-pledged gifts are lower as a result of not meeting in person. That amount equals 21.6% of estimated collections.

As a direct result of your generosity, we allocated over \$64,000 to go to community outreach partners that are meeting the needs on the front lines of the COVID-19 crisis. You can find a complete list of this year's grant recipients at **hbumc.org/outreach**.

We are also on track to provide funds for anticipated major capital expenditures, including roof replacement and ongoing HVAC unit replacement for systems in the older part of the building that have exceeded their expected lifespans.

At the beginning of the church closure period, we were uncertain of how our future would unfold. Thanks to you, our members, we are confident that Hayes Barton will continue to worship, serve, and fellowship together, in whatever forms that may unfold, through this time apart.
